1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Anand Niketan College of Science, Arts and Commerce, Warora, Dist. Chandrapur, the embodiment of Padma Vibhushan Baba Amte's creative intellectuality, came into being on June 20, 1964, and since then it has been known for academic excellence, inventive pursuits, and athletic dynamism. Affiliated to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, it is a multi-stream institution catering to diversity of the students and takes utmost care to provide basic and advanced higher education to the disadvantaged, rural section of the society.

The institution is eco-friendly, and has the UGC 2f and 12B status. The campus is spread over an area of about 108132 sq. mts. (26.72acres), hosting classrooms with ICT facilities, well equipped laboratories, library, auditorium, adequate facilities for sports and games and other necessary infrastructure.

In accordance with the vision and mission of providing quality higher education to students, the institution at present runs 3 UG and 13 PG programmes, and is recognized as "Institute of Higher Learning, Research and Specialized Studies" (IHLR&SS) by the affiliating University. With a distinct aim of producing good human resources with skill and ability, and of combating employment crisis, our institution also provides many skill-enhancement and employability development courses.

The affiliating university acknowledged the sincere attempts of the institution in this regard by conferring the "Best College Award" on us in 2019-20.

The institution has highly skilled, devoted, and sincere faculties committed to their goal of working for holistic development of students. They actively engage themselves in research activities like projects, research guidance. The institution organized number of national/international seminars/conferences. We feel proud to write that over a period of five years, we have 02 patents to our credit, 33 students earned their place in University Merit List, 181 University colour holders in sports over a period of five years. The two activities conducted by the institution - 24 hrs Suryanamaskar has been included in India Book of Records as well as in International Book of Records in 2022 as Longest Suryanamaskar Marathon Relay. 75 km Marathon from Bapukuti (Sewagram) to Anandwan has also been recorded in International Book of Records in 2022.

The institution is established by great visionary Shraddey Baba Amte with the vision to uplift educationally, economically, and socially underprivileged people through special focus on education and skill development which will lead them to live a dignified personal and social life. While in the college, institution makes the students and society at large realize that the leprosy is not a taboo or stigma. This is to be achieved through sustained efforts and initiatives.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college has a clear vision for upliftment of rural society through education by means of learning, research and extension. The college makes every effort to realize its mission of developing competent human resources through quality education, by creating innovative educational environment and promoting creativity to develop skilled human resource.

To provide better chances for distributing available educational opportunities, the college has made efforts to diversify the courses in tune with the diversifying interests and career opportunities. The college is running traditional courses like BA,B.Com,B.Sc. ,M.Sc.,MA,M.Com and Ph.D. programmes in Science faculty.

The college provides opportunities for better exposure to the students by conducting field trips, training programs for students through deputation to various reputed resource persons form academics and industries. Also faculty members have designed their own Value added/Certificate/Add on courses to provide additional knowledge and skills to the students.

To make the teaching and learning more innovative and interactive the college has been equipped with the modern gadgets like interactive boards (IP Boards), LCD projectors and other ICT tools.

However it is pertinent to mention that the college is supposed to teach the curricula designed by the affiliating university and the institute makes efforts for curriculum improvement through its representatives participating in boards of studies meetings who provide suggestions and inputs for revision of the syllabi in the respective Departments of the Gondwana University. The College has a defined mechanism for the effective implementation and timely completion of prescribed syllabi in various disciplines.

Well defined feedback system is implemented by college to get feedback on curriculum and based on that effective measures can be taken for the improvement.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- Admissions are done based on merit and Govt. GR is followed while giving admissions to the students, to follow the social justice. Category wise admission percentage is 83.65% for last 5 years due to presence of college in backward region where students belonging to backward categories are more. Total average enrolment percentage for last 5 years is 85.34%.
- Currently college has one fulltime teacher behind approximately every 73 students.
- Student centric methods adopted by the institution to provide experiential, participative and problem-solving methods have been implemented. Experiential learning involves hands on training to UG and PG students, projects by students, compulsory seminars, field trips as well as surveys. Participative learning is carried out through academic guidance lectures, seminars and workshops on various topics of emerging issues. Problem-solving methods include assignments, quizzes and competitive exams and interaction with students.
- Percentage of full-time teachers against sanctioned posts during the last five years is 67.06 whereas percentage of Ph. D. and NET/SET qualified teachers is 89.47.
- The internal assessment mechanism is followed as per the directives of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. This includes conduction of unit test exam, assignments to students, and active participation in routine class activities / seminars etc. Grievances related to exams are resolved at office level, departmental level and college level. Grievance committee look after and assures the smooth conduction of exam and problems related to exam and issues related to grade cards.
- The Institution adopts both direct and indirect methods. Direct Method involves course result and pass percentage of students. Indirect Method includes Google form survey conducted with passed out students and is analyzed to measure attainment of COs, POs and PSOs. Pass percentage of students during last five years is 91.20 percent, which is more than expected result.
- In students satisfactory survey it was observed that, opinion of the students about the institution, infrastructure of the college and teaching learning process is satisfactory. Any suggestions obtained from the students are always analyzed and tried to resolved sooner.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- Total Grants received from Government and non-governmental agencies for research projects in the last five years was Rs. 5.4 Lakhs INR.
- The Institution is actively engaged in creating an ecosystem for innovations and transfer of knowledge to the society through teachers, researchers, and students.
- Institution has been recognized in the band 'BEGINNER' under the category 'General (Non-Technical) in Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievement (ARIIA) 2021 by Ministry of Education, Government of India and received ISO 9001:2015 certification for providing quality education in Science, Arts and Commerce faculties at UG, PG and post PG levels.
- Along with a total of 13 PG programmes, 45 students are enrolled for the Ph. D. degree. There are 11 in-house and 09 Associate Research Supervisors. Institution's Innovation Council has been constituted and activated. The college has signed a total 24 MoUs /Collaborations with industries and institutes for facilitating collaborative, multidisciplinary teaching, learning and research activities.
- The college has conducted 20 workshops/seminars/conferences Research Methodology, Intellectual

Property Rights (IPR) and entrepreneurship during the last five years besides 09 workshops/seminars based on other topics.

- The faculties have published 55 papers in the journals notified on UGC website, 67 books/chapters, and 78 papers in Conference proceedings.
- 64 extension activities under NCC and NSS, and 14 extension activities by other departments were carried out during the last five years. During COVID19 pandemic the institution undertook some activities online and some activities offline, sensitizing students to social issues.
- The community services rendered by our NSS volunteers, during the Corona pandemic, were overwhelmingly recognized by the Member of Parliament, Nagar Parishad Warora etc., and were appreciated by NSS Maharashtra and Goa, and NSS Gondwana University. Street Plays based on AIDS awareness, have been awarded first prize by District Unit of National AIDS Control Program, for three consecutive years.
- The institution has signed a total of 24 MoUs/collaborations/linkages for research and academic activities during the last five years.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Physical Facilities

The college has adequate number of class rooms and laboratories as per norms laid down by statutory bodies. We have total Campus area of 26.72 acres, and total 25 classrooms each equipped with comfortable desks, benches, dais and black boards. 21 classrooms are with ICT facilities. There are well equipped laboratories to conduct practical. Classrooms are sufficient to occupy admitted students for classes and to conduct examinations.

The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor-outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc. and cultural activities. The institution always makes budgetary provision for augmentation of infrastructure.

Library as a Learning Resource

1. Library is partially automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)
2. e-journals and e-books – Remote as well as library access through N-LIST Program of INFLIBNET, NDL, DOAJ, DOAB, e-ShodhSindhu, etc.
3. During the span of 5 years average **76** users visited per working day to library

Library space such as reading room, stack room, and other sections is amply available for users of library. Library contributes to quality enhancement of students by providing ample quantity of text, reference and general books, journals, online resources, etc. Library proudly contains huge quantity of resources on competitive exams.

IT Infrastructure

The college has provided ample amount of computers and Laptops for the day-to-day use by students and faculty. Every department has its own computing facilities to meet the curriculum needs. All departments are provided with LCD projector for computer aided teaching.

Internet is provided to all the departments with maximum bandwidth of 20 mbps. The college has provided internet facilities to all staff members and students. 21 rooms are equipped with ICT facility. There are 4 smart classrooms and 1 room with smart TV. All these 5 rooms have LCD projectors and audio-visual aids. These 5 rooms are equipped with a smart board and visualizer also. We have 50kv generators and UPS for power back-up of entire college.

The institution always makes budgetary provision for maintenance of academic and physical facilities.

Student Support and Progression

Institution has continuously upheld the values that Maharogi Sewa Samiti is proud of. Our institution has distinguished itself as a prominent teaching-learning centre by upholding the glorious legacy of extracurricular and curricular activities. Many of our students have participated in sports and cultural events. On the academic front, some of our former students have become well-known scientists, students hold positions in the civil service, education, business and industry. Our students have embraced mankind and conquered the bounds of the earth in the field of social service.

- Every year, the institution updates its prospectus, which includes information about its vision, mission, and objectives as well as its fees and reservation policies.
- About 79.19% students receive financial assistance from Government.
- The college gives guidance to the students who prepare for competitive examinations. Many of our students have done well in All India Entrance Examinations for admission to NITs and University departments.
- A police training centre is opened in the college in which theoretical and physical training given to the students.
- Institution publishes its magazine, “Anand Niketan” every year.
- Capacity building and skills enhancement initiatives taken by the institution include the following: National level resume writing skill development workshop, value added course soft skill development, communicative English grammar & vocabulary building, course in yoga & meditation, computing skills: MS-excel & power point presentation skills.
- About 30% of total students were reported for higher education and 50% qualifying in competitive in competitive examinations.
- Students take part in various cultural and sport activities and won the prizes, some are mentioned here as Indian Book of Records for painting, Indian Book of Records & International Book of Records for longest surya namaskar marathon relay.
- Many students have participated in sport and cultural competitions organized by university, other institution or local bodies. Students awarded as colour holder by the university for representing university in inter-university competitions.
- An Alumni Association “Anand Niketan Mahavidyalaya Maji Vidyarthi Samiti, Warora” was established in Anand Niketan College, Anandwan, Warora. Alumni of the college contributed by different ways such as by visiting and interacting with students, delivering guidance and expert lectures, working as sports coach for college students and providing cash prize to the merit students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution is established with a vision to uplift educationally, economically and socially underprivileged

people through special focus on education and skill development. The institution has a Perspective Plan in place to help it achieve in a systematic, well-thought-out, and phased manner.

Maharogi Sewa Samiti is the apex body runs the college. The College Development Committee is entrusted with the responsibility of deciding policies. All the major administrative and academic decisions are taken by Principal in consultation with CDC.IQAC committee is entrusted with the responsibility to develop a system for conscious, consistent, and catalytic improvement in the overall performance of the institution. Under IQAC, various committees are in function to make the perspective plan come to reality.The institution has implemented e-governance in Administration, Finance and Accounts, Student Admission and Support, Examination effectively and successfully.

Performance appraisal of teachers is done through the Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) format prescribed by the UGC and approved by the affiliating university. For non-teaching-staff performance appraisal is assessed by Confidential Report (CR).

Teachers are provided with financial support to attend conferences/workshops and towards membership fees of professional bodies.

Members of teaching and non-teaching staff are encouraged to participate in Faculty development Programmes (FDP), professional development/administrative training programs.

The Institution maintains & follows a well-planned process for the mobilization of funds and utilization of resource. Internal Audit of the college is done every year. External Audit is done by Chief Auditor, Government of Maharashtra, Nagpur. The institute sends data for the same every year.

IQAC strives to carry out work essential for overall quality improvements of the college. Regular meetings of IQAC are conducted and decisions are taken. Quality enhancement of the institution is also done through collaborative activities with other reputed institutions. The institution registers for NIRF and AISHE. The ISO certification of the institution is done which is valid up to 2024.

Solar lamps have been installed in college ground. 40KW electricity is generated through solar panel. All street lights and outdoor lights in the premises are operated by sensor-based technology, College has installed power saving LED lights /power efficient BLDC fans. The institution works on e-waste management too. Rainwater harvesting, maintenance of water bodies and distribution system are in place in the campus. The institution has pedestrian friendly pathways, landscaping with trees and plants. The institution has built ramps for easy access to classrooms.

1] NSS for Society's Service

The NSS unit of the Institution was started in 2 Oct 1969. It annually organizes special camp in the selected village and addresses many issues for the awareness of the people living in the village. It undertakes activities like awareness rallies, cleanliness drive, blood donation camp, health checkup camp, plantation etc. The NSS unit of the Institution achieved various awards and appreciation letters for its service.

3] Institutional Distinctiveness

The performance of the institution is surely distinctive regarding student quality, Career Counselling & Training, Excellence in Sports and Teacher Quality. During the span of last 5 years 33 students earned their place in University Merit List. The college provides skill enhancement and employability development courses. During the span of 5 years since 2017 nearly 1500 students participated in 83 events at various levels. 161 medals are won in individual and team events. The number of university colour holders up to 2017 was 04. During last 5 years it reached to 176. **24 hrs Suryanamaskar activity has been included in India Book of Records and in International Book of Records in 2022 as Longest Suryanamaskar Marathon Relay. 75 km Marathon from Sewagram to Anandwan has also been recorded in International Book of Records in 2022.** The affiliating university conferred the **"Best College Award"** on us in 2019-20.

Anand Niketan College of Science, Arts and Commerce, Warora is currently having the following mechanisms for effective delivery of curriculum: Departmental curriculum planning with tentative schedule of implementation and duration to be carried out in the session 2017-18 to 2021-22 are collected from each department. Keeping in view the University Academic Calendar and information provided by each department, a consolidated College Academic Calendar is prepared. Each department strictly follows the College Academic Calendar and carry out its activities. College administration provides a well-constructed weekly timetable/schedule for each session /semester for both UG and PG classes. Departmental Heads hold the departmental meetings in which the topics in the syllabus are distributed to the teachers. Heads of the departments hold meeting with their colleagues to review the status of syllabus covered and other activities that are to be carried out.

Evaluation of students' learning at its best enables teachers to identify learners' strengths and weaknesses. The Internal assessment is done through class tests, assignments and mid-term examinations. Detailed reports are prepared and the internal marks are assigned to the students accordingly. Internal marks are displayed on the departmental notice boards and the grievances regarding this if any are sorted out in time. The term-end examinations are conducted as per the university guidelines from time to time.

Class notes are provided to the students by teachers.

Various classroom teaching methods based on diverse needs of different subjects are regularly used for the effective delivery of the curriculum such as:

1. Chalk and board method.
2. ICT-enabled teaching-learning method.
3. Seminars, quiz, class notes, PPT presentations, assignments, videos, etc. are used for effective curriculum delivery.
4. Project works and reports are collected as a part of the degree.
5. Guest lecture by experts is also arranged for the advancement of knowledge of students.
6. Regular assessment in practical classes, viva-voce, and unit test exams are done to keep track on the improvement of the students.

Institutional academic calendar is uploaded on the institutional website.

Based on the university format for internal assessment of the students, the institution has made mandatory of minimum requirement for each department as mentioned below:

In addition to minimum requirement, each department has freedom to add their own novel methodology for internal assessment of the students.

Grievances related University Exams: After issuing Hall Ticket, if any mistakes related to the subject combination are observed. It is verified by the college office. To avoid unfair means during exam period, chief supervisor, co-supervisor and prevention of unfair means committee look after and assures the smooth conduction of exam. Issues related to grade cards and revaluation is being resolved by the college exam committee and subject experts.

Grievances related Internal Exams:

Departmental Level:

Any query of the student related to internal examination is first mutually discussed with the faculty. The faculty handling the course convinces the students about specified criteria for allotting marks which is based on his/her performance. If student is not satisfied, then it is discussed with other faculty and HOD.

If the issue is not resolved at the departmental level, the student can approach to the principal of the college. The principal of the college consults with the faculty handling the course and HOD of the department and then matter is resolved.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

Since inception, the Institution is actively engaged in creating an ecosystem for innovations and transfer of knowledge to the society through teachers, researchers, and students. Institution has been recognized in the band 'BEGINNER' under the category 'General (Non-Technical)' in **Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievement (ARIIA) 2021** by **Ministry of Education, Government of India** and received **ISO 9001:2015 certification** for providing quality education in Science, Arts and Commerce faculties at UG, PG and post PG levels. Efforts taken by the institution during assessment period are enumerated below:

Ø **PG Program:** In addition to existing 06 PG programs, a total 07 PG programs in different disciplines of Humanities and Commerce have been initiated for facilitating Higher Learning and Research environments in respective faculties.

Ø **Institution of Higher Learning, Research and Specialized Studies:** This Institution is recognized as an 'Institution of Higher Learning, Research and Specialized Studies' by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. **Research Advisory Committee (RAC)** has been constituted for running Ph. D. programs within norms in all the disciplines. Total **45** students have enrolled for the Ph. D. degree at the center.

Ø **Human Resources:** There are **11 in-house** and **09 Associate Research Supervisors** to cater Innovations, Incubation and Research in different streams of Science faculty.

Ø **Institution's Innovation Council:** To encourage Students and Teachers to take up and participate in Innovation, Research and Start-Up activities using existing resources, **Institution's Innovation Council** has been constituted and activated.

Ø **Research Infrastructure:** To the existing competent infrastructure, two well equipped Research Laboratories with sophisticated instrumentation facilities were developed. **13** Research students have received Research Fellowships from funding agencies like **BARTI** and **MahaJyoti**. Faculty members received and successfully completed **01 Major** and **02 Minor** Research Projects funded by Institutes of repute like **DAE-BRNS, UGC, National Innovation Foundation-India**. 01 Minor project sanctioned by **STRC, Gondwana University** is ongoing. Institution and Industrial visits were arranged for teachers and students to foster 'Lab to Land' culture. Two days **Instrumentation Workshop for Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff** was organized for teacher, laboratory assistant and attendant to mobilize cooperative interdisciplinary research activities. Institution has a collection of NPTEL Learning resources (Video Lectures and Reading Materials) stored in 16 TB Hard Disc and is made available to Teachers and students for preparation through offline mode. Research Facilities are also extended to students from other institutions.

Ø **Collaboration:** College has signed a total 23 MoUs/Collaborations with industries and institutes for facilitating collaborative, multidisciplinary teaching, learning and research activities. Guest Lectures, Faculty Exchange, FDPs, IPR workshops and International Conferences have been successfully organized in collaboration with these organizations (See 3.2.2). Institutional membership of THE PROGRESS, Sri Aurobindo Yoga and Knowledge Foundation, India has been taken for extending national and international collaborations.

Ø **Knowledge Transfer:** The institution has developed an improved disease resistant variant of Chilli (*Capsicum annum* var. Bhivpuri) under Major Research Project funded by DAE-BRNS (2015-2018) and distributed the germplasm for testing among Chilli growers in the region. The Bio fungicide formulation developed by the institution has been tested in the field by distributing to the farmers in the region that got positive feedback.

Ø **Knowledge Sharing:** Departmental Libraries and Institution's Library and Information Resource Centre serves as Knowledge Sharing Centre for Teachers, Research Scholars and Students.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

To create social awareness and to inculcate a sense of social responsibility among them, the students are motivated to engage themselves in various social service activities and constructive work projects through NSS and NCC. Celebration of various national festivals and national/ international days help students strengthen their national spirit, as well as introduce them with international human unity.

In 2021-22, the institution organized different Online and Offline activities sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development. These activities include National Maths Day Quiz Competition held at schools in the nearby villages, Swachhata Pakhwada, Blood Donation Camp, Global Earth Day, Tree Plantation at Anandwan, Health Awareness and Tree Plantation at Pachgaon, NSS day, Mahatma Gandhi Jayanti, Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, Swachha Barat Abhiyan at Dongargaon Railway, E-waste Collection Program, Mission Yuva Swasthya (COVID-19 Vaccination), Vyasankmukti Abhiyan Pathnatya in surrounding villages, Aids Janjagruti Poster Competition, Plastic Nirmulan Rally at Warora, Maldhok Sanvardhan Sanrakshan Rally at Warora Wanvibhag, Rashtriy Ekatmata Shibir etc.

In 2020-21, a few extension activities were carried out due to lock-down during COVID-19 pandemic situation. The institution undertook some activities online and some activities offline, sensitizing the students to social issues. The Online activities included Hand Wash Activity, International Yoga Day, Kargil Vijay Diwas, International Yuva Din, NSS Wardhapan Din, Mahatma Gandhi Jayanti, Constitution Day, Safe Grandparents Campaign & Tobacco, Cancer, Covid Awareness Program. The Offline activities included Blood Donation Camp, Tree Plantation, and Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Jayanti. After getting some relief from lock-down, we organized some events, following Covid Appropriate Behaviour (CAB). These events were Apurva Vigyan Melava, Production and Distribution of improved Chilli variant and Biofungicide, Gardening, Fit India Freedom Run, etc.

In 19-20, the NCC unit organized Air Pollution Awareness Rally at Warora, Tree Plantation, Swachhata Pakhwada, Rangoli competition, Fit India Clean India Program, Aids Awareness Program and Bharat Jodo Marathon. The NSS students participated in the social programs such as Yuva Mahiti Doot, Mission Shakti, Swachhata Pandharwada, Meditation Seminar, Flood Relief Aid, NSS Wardhapan Din, Swachhata Abhiyan /Vruksharopan, Spit Free India Movement, AIDS Awareness Programme, One Day Special NSS Camp at Dadapur, Road Safety Week, University Level Camp, Filariia Education Programme, Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat, Tribal Youth Exchange Programme, and Covid -19 Awareness activities April / May-2020.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Facilities for various sports as well as faculty with its sincere devotion to the sports are the encountered problems in the beginning. The Institution with its efforts got these problems resolved.

BEST PRACTICE -2:

1. Title of the practice: NSS for Society's Service
2. Objectives of the practice: The National Service Scheme, launched in 1969, aimed at developing student's personality through community service. Its overall objective is education which is attained through the service of the community.
3. The Context : Serving to society is the social responsibility and core value to be demonstrated by the institutions of the country. Along with academic, social, and personal life, the NSS allows the students to contribute services to the community and the Nation. The Institution through these activities provides the students a platform to get involved with real life activities and the thereby become responsible citizens of India
4. The Practice : The NSS unit of the Institution was started in 2 Oct 1969 . It with its motto 'Not me but you' actively involved serving the society through various types of activities. It annually organizes special camp in the selected rural/tribal village and addresses many issues for the

awareness of the people living in the village. It undertakes activities like awareness rallies, cleanliness drive, blood donation camp, health checkup camp, plantation etc. It also facilitates some infrastructural development such as construction of road, well/ponds, drainages, etc.

5. Evidence of Success: The NSS unit of the Institution achieved various awards and appreciation letters for its service rendered to the society. Activities conducted and infrastructure development undertaken by it tells its glory of its efforts and provides evidence of success.
6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Lack of required facilities for NSS volunteers staying at camp. Unawareness and attitude of villages are the hurdles mobilizing them for their betterment. One very serious problem is that of finance. There is always a shortage of resources.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Our college, founded by renowned social worker Shraddey Baba Amte, was the only higher education institution in the periphery of 30-40 km at the time of inception. The vision and mission is to provide higher education to rural youth. Thus, it is at the top of priority of the institution to provide an opportunity for holistic development to rural students. The performance of the institution in this regard is surely distinctive, and can be summarized through following points:

1. Quality of Students –

Most of the students who seek admission in our college belong to rural area and poor background. However, they are adequately equipped with talent and knowledge. In line with its vision and mission, the institute provides student centric learning environment at utmost level. The institution gives opportunities to students to participate in every curricular, extracurricular and extension activities. Talents are watered and pruned. These attempts are reflective in the academic achievements of our college. During the span of last 5 years 33 students earned their place in University Merit List. The University exam result of the college is always good. To cater to the needs of rural students, particularly girls, the institution has started PG courses in Humanities and Commerce streams. PG courses in Science were already started during previous cycle of accreditation. Students also participate in various activities like Essay Competition, Debate, etc. and bring laurels to college. Every year nearly 15-20 students of B. Sc. and M.Sc. participate in Seminar competitions and many of them prizes.

2. Career Counseling and Training –

With a distinct aim of producing good human resources with skill and ability, and of combating employment crisis, our college provides skill enhancement and employability development courses. They are Mushroom Cultivation, Wildlife Tourism, etc. College runs some skill based certificate courses also. They are computer C, C++ language, Herbal Medicine, Honey Collection. The institution provides coaching for UPSC/MPSC and other competitive exams, and coaching for NET/SET exams. The college

also provides coaching and Training for entry into Police department and Defense services. Many students got selected. The institute invites eminent personalities for guidance on several issues to students. To name a few of them are Sh. Aditya Jiwane, IAS and Sh. Ayush Nopani, IPS. The ultimate aim is to impart training and knowledge to students so that they earn ability to excel in their career.

3. Excellence in Sports –

Considering the significance of sports in holistic development of students, the institution has laid utmost emphasis on activities related to sports. The institution has taken initiatives and developed infrastructure to accommodate wide range of games and sports. The hard work put by College and Physical Education Department is visible in victories gained and medals won by our students at university, state and national levels. The graph of achievement of sports department is continuously going higher and higher. After 2017, lots of new games are introduced for student. Outdoor sports facilities available during 2017 were of six games. However, the number in 2021-22 goes to 32 (05 indoor games and 27 outdoor games). Every type of game/sport has adequate infrastructure. During the span of 5 years since 2017 nearly 1500 students participated in 83 events at various levels. 161 medals are won in individual and team events. The number of University colour holder up to 2017 was 04. During last 5 years it reached to 176. We feel very proud to say that 02 activities conducted by sports department are included in various Books of Records. **24 hrs Suryanamaskar has been included in India Book of Records as well as in International Book of Records in 2022 as Longest Suryanamaskar Marathon Relay. 75 km Marathon from Bapukuti (Sewagram) to Anandwan has also been recorded in International Book of Records in 2022.**

As an extension of facilities to community, sports department organizes Summer Coaching Camp every year. This camp provides sports training and coaching to young children and youth from other schools and colleges of the vicinity. We are sure that these practices are the distinctive qualities we proudly possess.

4. Research Centre -

In accordance with the vision and mission of providing quality higher education to students, the institution has insisted on developing congenial atmosphere for research activities too. The institution is recognized as “Institute of Higher Learning, Research and Specialized Studies” (IHLR&SS) by the affiliating University. The institution aims at becoming as advanced research centre. As such it is committed to provide quality learning and infrastructure required for research works. All research laboratories are equipped with necessary equipments. As on today 52 students registered for PhD at our centre. 11 research students are awarded Maha Jyoti Fellowship and 02 students got BARTI Fellowship by Govt. of Maharashtra.

5. Teacher Quality -

The institution has highly skilled, devoted and knowledgeable teaching staff to cater to the needs of students. Faculty members are very sincere and committed to their goal of working for holistic development of students. They continuously upgrade their skills and knowledge. Many of them have

successfully completed Online Courses on SWAYAM platform. To keep with the pace of time, our faculty member uses ICT tools very effectively in teaching-learning process. They actively engage themselves in research activities like projects, research guidance, etc. We have 16 teachers with Ph D as their highest qualification, all of whom are research supervisors. Few teachers have their research papers published in Scopus indexed journals. Nearly 56 articles are published in journals notified by UGC. Culmination of all these teaching-learning and research activities can be seen in the fact that we have 06 teachers who reached to post of Professor (AL 14) through CAS promotion. We feel proud to write that we have 02 patents to our credit.

Thus, the priority of college to provide quality higher education to young minds becomes visible. The affiliating university acknowledged the sincere attempts of the institution in this regard by conferring the **“Best College Award”** on us in 2019-20.
